### Spring Musical - Thoroughly Modern Millie



# Duchesne Hockey Club

The Duchesne Hockey Club (DHC) was formed in 1996 and held its inaugural season during the 1997-1998 school year. Over its 23-year history they have been to the Wickenheiser finals four times, only to fall short of winning a championship. But this year, the DHC took home the Wickenheiser Cup!

Following another second-place finish in 2018-2019, the 2019-2020 season started off like many others in recent years. The coaching staff, most of which are Duchesne graduates and former DHC players, met to assess player availability and how they would roster a competitive team. Each year hockey clubs across the St. Louis area start by collecting the students at their "home" school (aka DHS). This year Duchesne had 15 players, which is a pretty good starting number, but well short of other larger clubs in the Mid States league. They still needed to pull from area "draft" players to find other players to round out a full roster. Duchesne was able to pick up six more players from surrounding schools to play on its team.

Despite an injury-plagued season and missing players due to travel club conflicts, the DHC completed their 21-game season with a winning record and finished second in the St. Charles conference. After advancing through the 4-team pool play, they faced Westminster in a quarter-final match that went into a game-deciding overtime shoot-out. Junior forward Austin Meers scored on the second DHC shot and senior goalie Jack Boschert stopped all three shots he faced to seal the win!

High school hockey in Missouri consists of five leagues and part of the Mid-States Club Hockey Association (MSCHA). The MSCHA is a non-profit organization dedicated to the development of high school hockey. At the conclusion of the regular season, the teams ranked in the top 12 play a round-robin format playoff leading up to the Challenge Cup championship game. The next 16 ranked teams play a similar round-robin format playoff for the Wickenheiser Memorial Cup. The remaining teams play in a traditional playoff style format for the Founders Cup.





# Wins Wickenheiser Cup

After beating Fox in the semi-finals, the DHC not only prepared to battle the Goliath-sized Oakville (a high school more than five times the size of Duchesne), but raced to simply play the game against the growing pressures of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The championship game was set for 5:30 pm on Wednesday, March 11, at the Enterprise Center in downtown St. Louis. The student body and faculty gave the team a resounding sendoff that afternoon in preparation for the game. With nearly every student in attendance, DHC held a 1-0 lead through the first and second periods. Tied the 1-1 with less than two minutes remaining in the game, senior forward Trevor Begley scored his second goal of the game to clinch the first DHC championship in the club's history. The next morning it was announced that St. Louis events exceeding 1,000 attendees were prohibited, which would have essentially ended Duchesne's opportunity for its first championship.

It was truly a team effort from the board, coaching staff, and players, and one of the best wins to celebrate for the dedicated parents, students, and DHC hockey fans. The pandemic did delay the season-ending banquet where awards and recognition were given out for individual accomplishments, but it was well worth the wait.

Gwen was born with a rare and complex neurological disease. She spent a lot of time at St. Louis Children's Hospital during the first year of her life. After Gwen's second birthday, her diagnosis switched to progressive and degenerative, and she was admitted to the Wings Program (an in-home pediatric palliative and hospice care program).

Gwendolyn's Gifts has a goal to make Gwen smile every day! Gwen's sweet and sassy energy is infectious and this little girl loves seeing and hearing others find joy in her gifts and/or support. At first, Erin and Mark simply collected \$7,000 for 85 Smile Bags. The Smiles Bags were given to children who were in the hospital or on hospice care. After the warm response from the children, parents, and hospital staff alike, Erin and Mark

knew this couldn't be a "one-time thing."

The organization has grown quickly in two years. The mission is to provide emotional and financial support to families of children on palliative and/or hospice care. Gwendolyn's Gifts strives to spread joy by delivering Smile Bags, celebrating holidays, and/or fulfilling a special request.

I couldn't wait to let them know I got it back! I'm so grateful to Dawn and Jeffery."

Jeffery is a 1987 St. Charles High graduate and Dawn is from St. Charles West's class of 1989, but neither knew Mike, even though they were all teenagers going to high school at about the same time and in close proximity to one another. When we thanked the Kings for their thoughtfulness in reaching out to Duchesne, they graciously thanked *us*.

"Thank you for all your help on this! We're just so happy he got his ring back and that there was a good



ending to the story," Jeffery said.

# 2020 PANDEMIC

Pivot! That seems to be the theme for 2020, and Duchesne has done so with great agility. Duchesne's campus shut down along with the rest of the country in mid-March. It felt like it happened over night and many people were frightened, confused, and generally worried about the future.

But the Duchesne community never skipped a beat. Our faculty, staff, and students rose to the occasion and "pivoted" to distance learning with relative ease. Weeks prior to the stay-at-home order, Principal Fritz Long and academic deans Dominic D'Urso '95, Renee (Reimer) Moore '86, Julie Renaud, and Kris (Birk) Witzel '83 were meeting to map out the best process for how to hold classes virtually in real time, how to take attendance, and how to handle all the other myriad details of having school out of school. Director of technology Kim Choinka trained the teachers on Google Classroom and Zoom. When classes dismissed for spring break on March 13, it wasn't known what would be happening on the scheduled return date of March 23, but we were ready!

By the time spring break was over, people were working from home and students were attending school online. Duchesne's teachers and students had very few problems in managing school this way. Having had a similar experience previously with eLearning days (our online learning plan for bad-weather days that we have had in place for several years), the transition to teaching and learning while being quarantined was that much simpler.

The biggest challenge our community initially faced was not being able to personally interact with each other, which is so important for building trust and communication between teachers and their students. The pictures on this page show one way our faculty and staff made it known that we are always there for our kids. In less than 24 hours on a weeknight at the end of April, about 15 faculty and staff members delivered over 400 Pioneer Nation yard signs, one to each of our housebound cur-

rent and incoming students' homes. Signs were also placed in the yard of everyone who is on our faculty, in the main office, or in the Advancement office. It was a wonderful show of support – yet another example of the warmth we feel for one another as members of the Duchesne family, no matter what the circumstances!

Now, with only being a few months into the 2020-2021 school year, we are still pivoting and accommodating the times. We are grateful to be back in school, with new regulations and precautions, so we can continue to build our teacher-student relationships face to face (or mask to mask, as is the case). We have started the school year with the majority of our students in class on campus and have social distancing, mask, and sanitization standards for all to follow.

Additionally, we are accommodating our students who are virtual learning for various health reasons. We have transitioned to using Schoology instead of Google Classroom. Schoology allows our small number of online students to join the in-person classroom through a webinar feature.

Of course, if the world needs to shut down again, we have the resources and knowledge to "pivot" once again, continuing to provide our students with the best education experience possible.

# ANDREW SWEESO '17 PRESIDENT OF LABRE AT SLU

Andrew Sweeso graduated from Duchesne in 2017 and now attends Saint Louis University, studying English with a minor in Catholic Studies. During his time at Duchesne, Andrew developed a passion for service through the service hours required to graduate. However, he wanted to do more than what was required.

For his Junior Week of Service in 2016, Andrew asked the Duchesne campus minister to put him to the test. He wanted to go on the "front lines" of his faith and requested the most challenging service opportunity.

Andrew was chosen to volunteer in front of Planned Parenthood. His duty was to try to persuade those going into the clinic to turn around and not enter. Andrew didn't have anyone who was walking into the clinic shout profanities or use any unjust hand

gestures, but many people on the street did those things as they drove by. Andrew said, "Even though we were getting yelled at and ridiculed for our faith, I felt God's presence and I got the urge to keep pushing myself to do God's work."

Since this eye-opening experience, Andrew has brought his passion for others to Saint Louis University's campus. Currently, Andrew is president of a group called Labre, a student-run campus organization whose mission it is to build relationships with their unhoused friends and neighbors. The organization above all is a relational ministry.

Labre was established at Saint Louis University in 2010 by former students of the original founding school, St. Ignatius High School in Cleveland, who wanted to bring this remarkable outreach program to the unhoused in the City of St. Louis. There are 20-30 students in Labre at this writing and membership numbers are growing.



The group provides meals, clothes, and shelter, and helps find permanent housing for those in need. "There is no better feeling in the world than to have one of my friends [unhoused persons] find a permanent home," Andrew explained.

But Labre doesn't just stop at finding permanent homes for the unhoused. They follow up with them, ask how things are going, and offer to help as may be needed. Andrew stated, "These people are my friends and I want to make sure they are happy and safe. We spend weeks and months with these people and a natural true friendship occurs. I couldn't imagine just never speaking to them again after they are housed."

Duchesne President Chuck Nolan and Principal Fritz Long, along with their graduation committee, helped to make that goal a reality. This year Duchesne pivoted from the traditional gymnasium graduation ceremony and conducted a drive-in graduation instead. Our families had the opportunity to experience graduation for their seniors in our front parking lot on June 4, with full social distancing for all who desired it.

Utopia Entertainment was contracted and provided a jumbo screen and sound system, a radio station feed, and a recording of the ceremony, which each senior received in a follow-up mailing. The schematic allowed for each graduate's family to experience their student's moment in the spotlight while keeping at least 6 feet apart from the other families. Parents and siblings escorted their senior to the stage in order to see him or her walk and pick up their diploma.

Elected by their classmates, Libbi Kleitz presented the baccalaureate speech, traditionally presented at Mass two days before graduation, and Maria DelGiudice gave the graduation speech. (The baccalaureate Mass had to be cancelled due to the coronavirus precautionary restrictions in place at the time). Both of these ladies went above and beyond their expected duty.

Libbi captivated the audience by bringing a sense of calm and peace to these very uncertain times. "As I was thinking of how to best convey all the unique gifts this school has given us, I couldn't help but think of a few gifts of the Holy Spirit," Libbi proclaimed. "Class of 2020, as we go forth into the world, it is my sincere hope and belief that we can turn these gifts of the Holy Spirit into fruits of the Holy Spirit. Paul has also been St. Charles County's Umpire-in-Chief since 1989, overseeing slo-pitch softball umpires, leagues, and tournaments, and serving as the liaison between the umpire organization and the recreational directors for all St. Charles County city parks.

A good example to the students with whom he's worked, Paul received the basketball Sportsmanship Award six times and football Sportsmanship Award four times from the International Association of Approved Basketball Officials/Football Officials.

That's thousands of graduates who will remember his announcements, dress code reminders, dance oversights, confidential conversations, and most importantly, his kindness, understanding, and support.

Mr. Clodius was first at Duchesne in the 1990-1991 school year, when he was our head football coach and coached track. He worked elsewhere for 10 years and then returned to Duchesne as the Dean of Student Services in 2001. In addition to his position as dean, Mr.Clodius also coached boys soccer for two years and girls soccer until 2009, when Duchesne won the first of six state championships.

Thank You for everything, Mr. Clodius. Enjoy your well-deserved retirement!

Mr. Clodius was awarded NFL Teacher of the Year in 2006 after being nominated by Trent Green, quarterback for the Kansas City Chiefs at the time. Prior to his tenure at Duchesne, Mr. Clodius spent 18 years at St. John Vianney High School, where he taught, coached, and was dean of students, and where his impact on Trent Green always stayed with the eventual football star. "He saw something in me before I did — on and off the field," Green said. From 1990-2010, nominees for the Walter Payton Award were given the opportunity to nominate a teacher who had the single greatest impact on their life. Green chose Mr. Clodius, and so did the NFL!

Sr. Marie Ambrose Peters, SSND

Many alumni will remember Sr. Marie Ambrose Peters, SSND, who passed away on May 23, 2020, at the age of 89. Sr. Ambrose had a teaching and administrative career that spanned 50 years, including service to Duchesne High School as principal from 1971 through 1977.

Born in Leopold, Missouri, to a farm family that eventually had six boys and three girls, Bernice Marie Peters discovered Catholic education after she pleaded with her parents to allow her to attend St. Mary High School (now Cape Catholic) in Cape Girardeau. She took a bus 30 miles each way every weekday. As this was in the late 1940s, one can imagine that the bus ride took quite a bit longer than 30 or 40 minutes. But young Bernice was determined and undaunted.

"That type of childhood history sounds just like Sr. Ambrose," said Terry Gravemann '68, who began teaching at Duchesne in 1973 while Sr. Ambrose was principal. (After teaching social studies at DHS, Terry would later become dean of students and then president at Duchesne, retiring in 2012.) "She had the most powerful handshake!" Terry continued. "That handshake

was a reflection of her strength of character and her strong faith. Nothing fazed Sr. Ambrose; she tackled any and every problem with diligence and determination."

Dale Burkemper, who taught business at Duchesne during the 1969-1970 school year and then returned from 1972 to 1979, recalled this: "Sr. Ambrose believed students should always be challenged in order to do their best, not be hesitant to try something new, and learn that failure is a part of life. She challenged herself as well, in all kinds of ways. One time, she and Terry Gravemann joined some students in a pizza-eating contest at the grand opening of Ken's Pizza on Duchesne Drive. She was a fierce competitor, matching most of the participants slice per slice. Others could hardly move after all the pizza, but Sr. Ambrose just kept going without missing a beat! She proceeded from the pizza plates to a formal dinner at Saint Louis University as if nothing else of significance had occurred that day."

In addition to her tenure in administration at Duchesne, Sr. Ambrose was a teacher or in a leadership position at five other schools, mostly in St. Louis. Additionally, she held a number of positions associated with the School Sisters of Notre Dame on their campus in South St. Louis. In 1987, Sr. Marie Ambrose was honored at the National Catholic Educational Association convention as one of the 40 outstanding Catholic educators in the United States.



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# Planned Giving

### WHAT IS PLANNED GIVING?

Creating a Planned Gift enables individuals like you to make larger gifts to Duchesne High School than you could make from ordinary income. Planned Giving is sometimes referred to as Gift Planning or Legacy Giving.





### **GIVE NOW:**

### **GIVE LATER:**

Typically a gift made through language in your will or trust, by beneficiary designation on an IRA or Insurance Policy, or as a beneficiary on a piece of property. The estate will receive appropriate acknowledgment of the gift from the Foundation.

### **GIVE & RECEIVE:**

Typically, such a gift is centered on either the creation of a Charitable Gift Annuity or a Charitable Remainder Trust. In both circumstances, a gift (typically of a highly appreciated asset) is made to the Foundation and the donor receives an agreed-upon income stream for a period of time. As the donor, you will receive a tax deduction in accordance with tax laws in effect at the time the gift is received by the Foundation.

Whether a donor uses cash, appreciated securities/stock, real estate, artwork, partnership interests, life insurance, a retirement plan, etc., the benefits of funding a Planned Gift can make this type of charitable giving very attractive to both you and Duchesne High School.

Your desire to create a Planned Gift allows you to:

- Fulfill your passion to support Duchesne High School
- Establish a lasting legacy to honor those you love
- Designate how your gift is to be used
- Feel comfortable knowing that your gift, if used to add to or create an endowment at the Roman to Catholic Foundation, will be managed in accordance with Catholic values.
