Hi all,

As many of you know, **Sincerity** is this year's theme. With that theme comes a prayer that we say at the end of each All School Mass, which asks for the strength to be honest in our words and attentive in our listening. Listening attentively has been on my mind recently. In my senior class, we just started to read Shakespeare's *Richard II*. That play begins with two antagonist hearing the words of their king, but not really listening. So I started to think about what it means to listen attentively, and naturally the 17th century metaphysical poet George Herbert came to mind.

One of Herbert's classic poems is "The Collar." Herbert was a clergy member of The Church of England, and the poem starts with him chaffing against the limits his priestly collar places upon him. The first line is quite violent: "I struck the board, and cried, 'No more!'" The "board" is widely believed by Herbert scholars to be an alter. The title combined with the opening line give us an image of a priest rejecting his vocation and possibly of a man rejecting his religion and God.

The vast majority of the poem develops that idea, with Herbert complaining about all of the sacrifices the priestly life has foisted upon him. Primarily he regrets not having the freedom a more secular life would give him; he feels like his sacred life has placed him in a prison. The end of the poem, like so many other metaphysical poems, upends the ideas ostensibly developed throughout its opening lines. It does so with an astounding act of attentive listening. It is that attentive listening I'll leave you with today:

But as I raved and grew more fierce and wild

At every word,

Methought I heard one calling, Child!

And I replied, My Lord.
